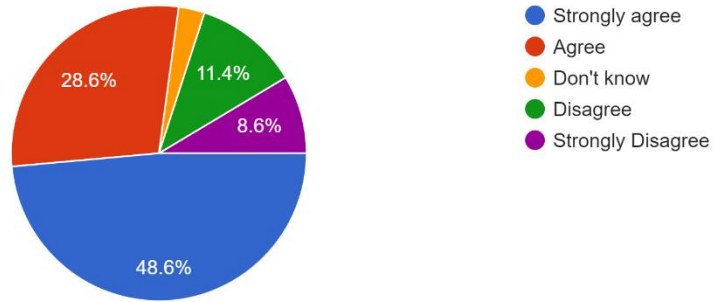

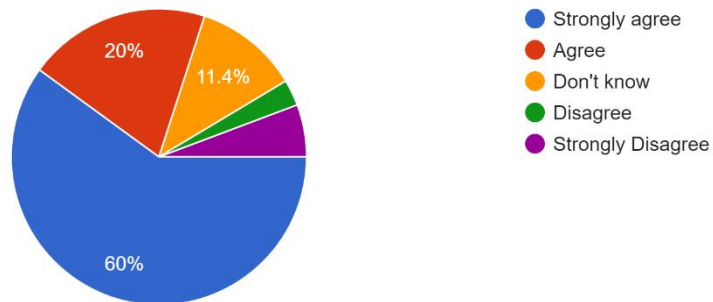
1. My child is happy at this school

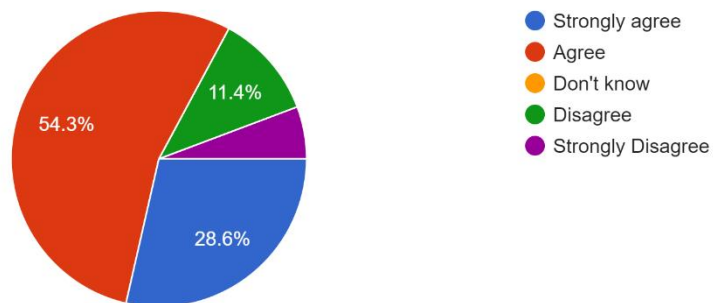
2. My child feels safe at this school

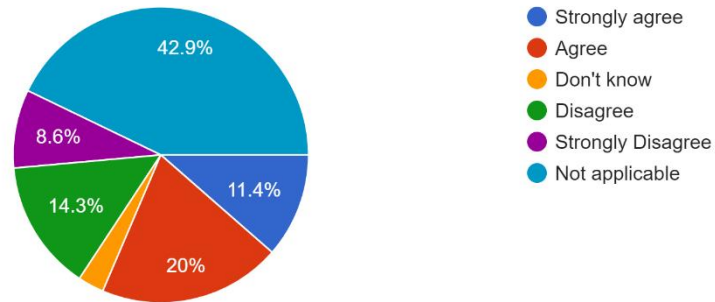


3. The school ensures its pupils are well behaved

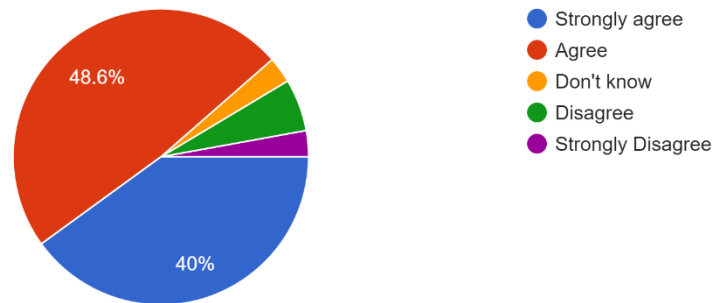

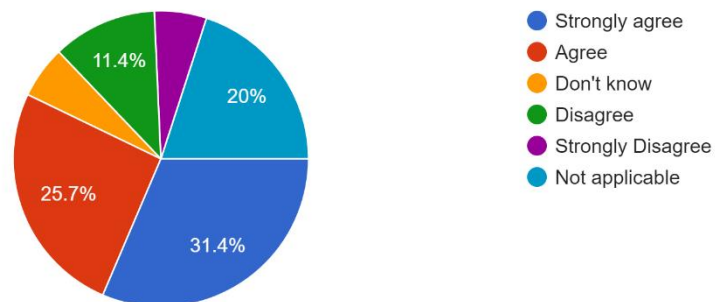
4. My child has been bullied and the school dealt with it quickly and effectively

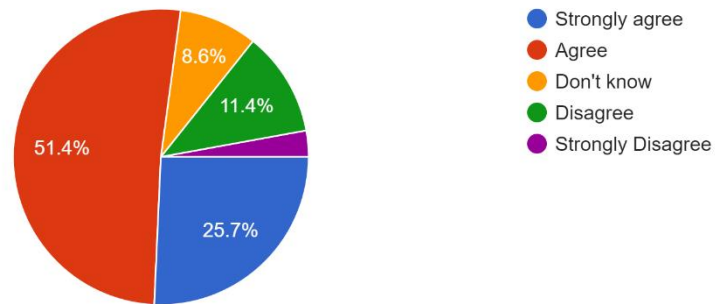


6. When I have raised concerns with the school they have been dealt with properly

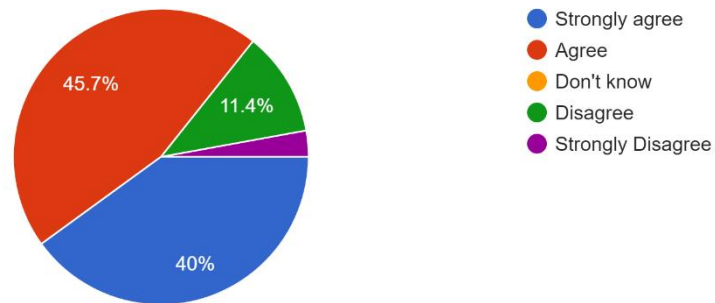

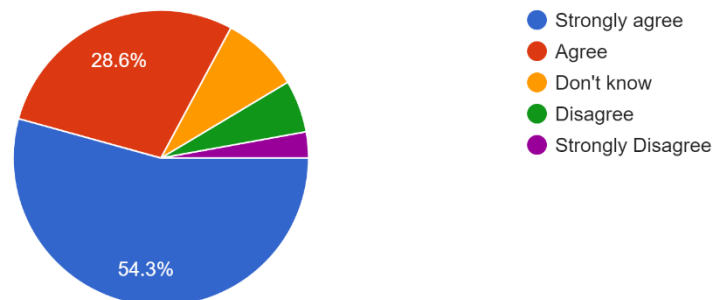
8. There is a good range of subjects available for my child at this school

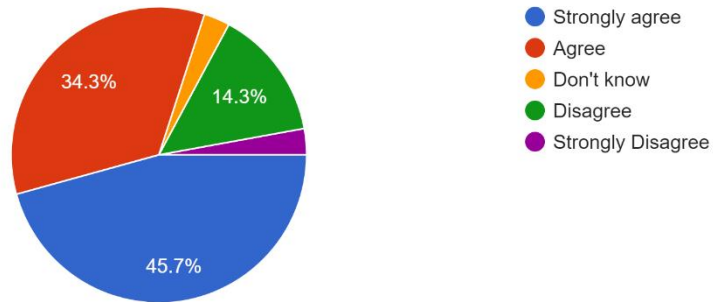
9. My child enjoys taking part in school enrichment activities (e.g. sports and science week and clubs)

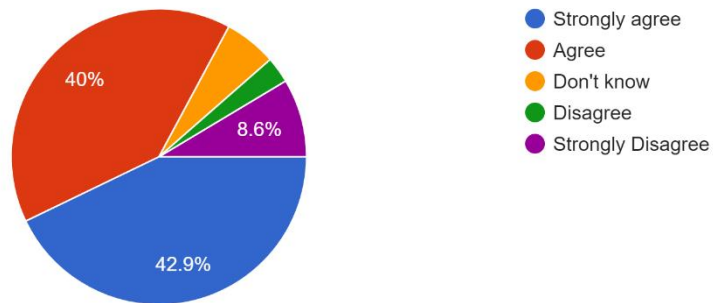
10. The school supports my child's personal development

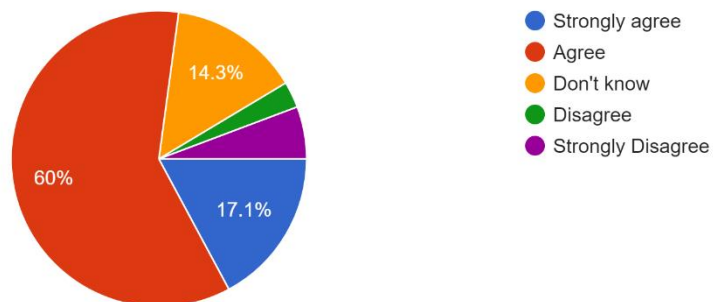
11. I feel that my child is cherished at this school

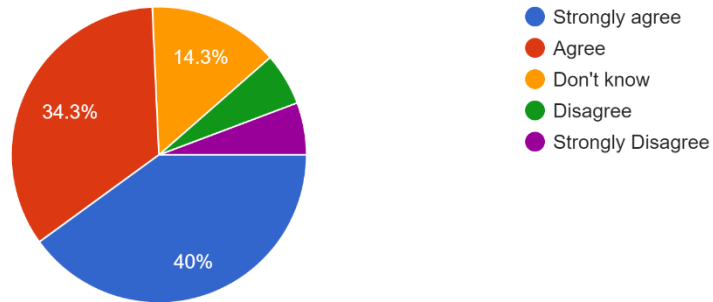
12. I feel that my child is challenged at this school

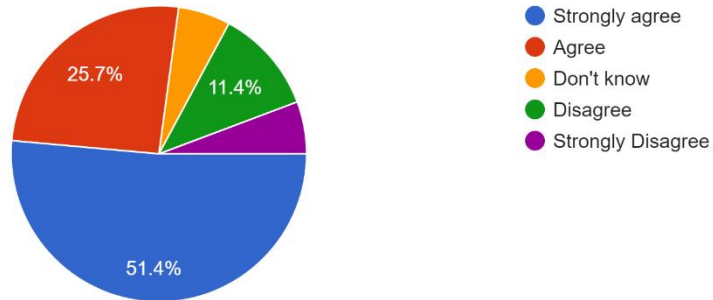
13. My child feels accepted and valued as a Child of God at this school

I would like to Open free courses such as swimming, mathematics, sports.

Perhaps less homework for infants. Some children may cope well with this but our child struggles after she has concentrated so hard throughout the day.

Bullying

Better communication for new parents in the first few weeks

I would have aaid communicatin but i feel recently its been better

I believe the communication home could be better, for example if the PE or swimming day changes, it would be great if parents were informed via dojo or similar, instead of relying on children to pass on the message (which most inevitably forget the moment they walk out of the gates). I would also like to see a teacher come out on time every morning to collect the class from the playground, so that parents can speak to them if nec. We often find that our teachers come out last and stand on the steps to call the class up, parents are then left to try and chase teacher/class up the steps in order to have a quick word, or end up going to the office when we really just want a quick word with a teacher. Please ask them all to come out on time. Thank you

Lower the staff turn over and for TAs not to teach in the same class their children are in

Sometimes I think that my children could be challenged academically a bit more. My son in particular will take the easier, minimum option if available. So sometimes I think he isn't stretched a little by HW.

I think a language should be added to the curriculum like with most other primary school in Leeds

Direct update on school events to parents in case kids forget to

I'd love to see some development in the behaviour policy, with a move away from punishments/consequences that are visible to the whole class (ie raincloud)

More understanding of autism, reasonable adjustments and mental health

Would love more extra curricular lunchtime clubs but realise this is hard for teachers!

After school clubs tend not to be very varied. Martial arts, orchestra/band for beginners, pottery, screen printing, choir, board games, book club... are there ways of thinking more broadly? I wonder how some of our children, whose parents can't afford lessons or who wouldn't think of it, could discover and develop eg musical giftings if not through school. Studies have shown that being part of a choir and doing martial arts are the two best things you can do to help your mental health - with such demand on SEMH support maybe this could be another way to help kids in this way as well as widening interests?

Healthier school lunches, stretch/challenge kids who are more able

Only reading for homework in lower years. Less focus on phonics screening!
